#### BUILDING RESILIENT SOILS IN CHANGING WEATHER CONDITIONS

Weather extremes—whether drought or flooding—are becoming a bigger challenge for farms. One of the most effective tools to buffer against these stresses is soil organic matter (SOM). Healthy soils rich in SOM improve water management, nutrient cycling, and overall farm resilience, making them a cornerstone of sustainable and profitable agriculture.

Soil organic matter acts like a sponge. It increases infiltration so more rainwater soaks in rather than running off, and it boosts water-holding capacity, storing moisture for crops and forages during dry periods. SOM also drives nitrogen mineralization, releasing nutrients throughout the season. Together, these processes reduce crop stress, stabilize forage supplies, and lower input needs.

Improving soil organic matter requires an integrated approach. Managed grazing keeps plants growing, returning carbon to the soil through roots and manure. Crop rotation and cover crops diversify plant communities, protect against erosion, and feed soil biology. No-till practices minimize disturbance, allowing SOM to build. Thoughtful nutrient management ensures fertilizers are used efficiently, reducing losses, while integrating crops and livestock closes nutrient loops and enhances biological diversity. These practices strengthen soil structure, making fields more resilient to compaction,

Soil organic matter is also one of the best indicators of soil health. Farms with higher SOM weather droughts and floods with less yield loss, maintain steadier forage for livestock, and reduce fertilizer and irrigation costs. Healthier soils translate into more resilient, profitable farms by lowering risk and dependence on expensive inputs.

Every percent increase in SOM is an investment in resilience. By adopting practices like managed grazing, cover crops, crop rotation, and reduced tillage, farmers can improve immediate production while building soils that sustain agriculture for future generations.
